Tools How to Read And Pray the Psalms

Multiple years ago I was given this method of reading the Psalms. It is almost that they are meant to be read this way. Many mornings, when I needed it most, this method imparted their riches into my life.

Why read the scriptures, or more specifically the Psalms?

This book of Psalms is so gritty. It is full of real life and real life emotions. When you read, try to use a modern version such as NIV or The Message. Read the book with this method everyday for a month. Then, read it again in another translation the next month. This book will revitalize your spiritual life and your connection with God's work in your life.

"Great peace have they who love your law, and nothing can make them stumble." (Ps. 119:165, NIV)

"The unfolding of your words gives light; it gives understanding to the simple." (Ps. 119:130, NIV)

"My prayer is not that you take them (disciples, 'my insert') out of the world but that you protect them from the evil one. They are not of the world, even as I am not of it. Sanctify them by the truth; your word is truth. As you sent me into the world, I have sent them into the world. For them I sanctify myself, that they too may be truly sanctified. "My prayer is not for them alone. I pray also for those who will believe in me through their message," (John 17:15–20, NIV)

How To Use This Tool:

Simply go off the day of the month that you are currently in. The example below would be for the **22**nd of any given month. Each day you will read 5 Psalms per day.

Read the Psalm that corresponds with the day 22^{nd} , then add 30 and read the next, so in this example read the 52^{nd} , then add 30 and read the 82^{nd} then add 30 and read 112^{th} and one more add 30 and read Psalm 142.


If you do this each day you will read the entire book of Psalms in a month. The only exception will be on the 29^{th} day of the month and the 31^{st} . You

will take the Psalms 119 out of the reading for the 29^{th} . The reason for this is because the 119^{th} Psalm is a very long Psalm of 176 verses. Instead, you will put it onto the 31^{st} of whatever month has 31 days. It will be the only one you will read on the 31^{st} . It will work out that you will read Psalm 119 about every second month.

By doing this method you will read through the entire book. You will be amazed how it almost seems like it was supposed to be read this way.

One More Thing:

I received great benefit by doing this and by reading them out loud to myself while in a prayer posture, allowing them to prompt prayer conversation with God. While reading I made notes in the margin of my Bible and circled key thoughts and underlined whenever I was impressed to do so. My Bible in the Psalms looks very well used.



Example Day - the 22nd of the month.

Psalm 22

For the director of music. To the tune of "The Doe of the Morning." A psalm of David.

- ¹My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from saving me, so far from my cries of anguish?
- ² My God, I cry out by day, but you do not answer, by night, but I find no rest.
- ³Yet you are enthroned as the Holy One; you are the one Israel praises.
- ⁴In you our ancestors put their trust; they trusted and you delivered them.
- ⁵To you they cried out and were saved; in you they trusted and were not put to shame.
- ⁶But I am a worm and not a man, scorned by everyone, despised by the people.
- ⁷All who see me mock me; they hurl insults, shaking their heads.
- 8 "He trusts in the LORD," they say,

"let the LORD rescue him.

Let him deliver him,

since he delights in him."

- Yet you brought me out of the womb; you made me trust in you, even at my mother's breast.
- ¹⁰ From birth I was cast on you; from my mother's womb you have been my God.
- ¹¹Do not be far from me, for trouble is near and there is no one to help.
- ¹² Many bulls surround me; strong bulls of Bashan encircle me.
- ¹³ Roaring lions that tear their prey

open their mouths wide against me.

¹⁴I am poured out like water, and all my bones are out of joint.

My heart has turned to wax; it has melted within me.

- ¹⁵ My mouth₁ is dried up like a potsherd, and my tongue sticks to the roof of my mouth; you lay me in the dust of death.
- ¹⁶ Dogs surround me, a pack of villains encircles me; they pierce my hands and my feet.
- ¹⁷ All my bones are on display; people stare and gloat over me.
- ¹⁸They divide my clothes among them and cast lots for my garment.
- ¹⁹ But you, LORD, do not be far from me.
 You are my strength; come quickly to help me.
- Deliver me from the sword, my precious life from the power of the dogs.
- ²¹ Rescue me from the mouth of the lions; save me from the horns of the wild oxen.
- ²² I will declare your name to my people; in the assembly I will praise you.
- ²³ You who fear the LORD, praise him! All you descendants of Jacob, honor him! Revere him, all you descendants of Israel!
- ²⁴ For he has not despised or scorned the suffering of the afflicted one; he has not hidden his face from him

but has listened to his cry for help.

- ²⁵ From you comes the theme of my praise in the great assembly; before those who fear you. I will fulfill my vows.
- The poor will eat and be satisfied; those who seek the LORD will praise him may your hearts live forever!

²⁷ All the ends of the earth will remember and turn to the LORD, and all the families of the nations will bow down before him,
²⁸ for dominion belongs to the LORD

and he rules over the nations.

- ²⁹ All the rich of the earth will feast and worship; all who go down to the dust will kneel before him those who cannot keep themselves alive.
- ³⁰ Posterity will serve him; future generations will be told about the Lord.
- ³¹They will proclaim his righteousness, declaring to a people yet unborn:
 He has done it!

For the director of music. A *maskil* of David. When Doeg the Edomite had gone to Saul and told him: "David has gone to the house of Ahimelek."

¹Why do you boast of evil, you mighty hero? Why do you boast all day long, you who are a disgrace in the eyes of God?

- ²You who practice deceit, your tongue plots destruction; it is like a sharpened razor.
- ³You love evil rather than good, falsehood rather than speaking the truth.
- ⁴You love every harmful word, you deceitful tongue!
- ⁵ Surely God will bring you down to everlasting ruin: He will snatch you up and pluck you from your tent; he will uproot you from the land of the living.
- ⁶The righteous will see and fear; they will laugh at you, saying,
- 7 "Here now is the man who did not make God his stronghold but trusted in his great wealth
- and grew strong by destroying others!"

 *But I am like an olive tree
- flourishing in the house of God; I trust in God's unfailing love

for ever and ever.

⁹ For what you have done I will always praise you in the presence of your faithful people.

And I will hope in your name, for your name is good.

A psalm of Asaph.

- ¹God presides in the great assembly; he renders judgment among the "gods":
- ² "How long will you defend the unjust and show partiality to the wicked?
- ³ Defend the weak and the fatherless; uphold the cause of the poor and the oppressed.
- ⁴Rescue the weak and the needy; deliver them from the hand of the wicked.
- ⁵ "The 'gods' know nothing, they understand nothing. They walk about in darkness; all the foundations of the earth are shaken.
- 6"I said, 'You are "gods"; you are all sons of the Most High.'
- ⁷But you will die like mere mortals; you will fall like every other ruler."
- ⁸ Rise up, O God, judge the earth, for all the nations are your inheritance.

- ⁵Good will come to those who are generous and lend freely, who conduct their affairs with justice.
- ⁶ Surely the righteous will never be shaken; they will be remembered forever.
- ⁷They will have no fear of bad news; their hearts are steadfast, trusting in the LORD.
- ⁸Their hearts are secure, they will have no fear; in the end they will look in triumph on their foes.
- ⁹They have freely scattered their gifts to the poor, their righteousness endures forever; their horn will be lifted high in honor.

- ¹I cry aloud to the LORD;
 - I lift up my voice to the LORD for mercy.
- ²I pour out before him my complaint;
 - before him I tell my trouble.
- ³When my spirit grows faint within me, it is you who watch over my way.
- In the path where I walk
 - people have hidden a snare for me.
- ⁴Look and see, there is no one at my right hand;
 - no one is concerned for me.
- I have no refuge;
 - no one cares for my life.
- ⁵I cry to you, LORD;
 - I say, "You are my refuge,
 - my portion in the land of the living."
- ⁶ Listen to my cry,
 - for I am in desperate need;
- rescue me from those who pursue me,
 - for they are too strong for me.
- ⁷Set me free from my prison,
 - that I may praise your name.
- Then the righteous will gather about me
 - because of your goodness to me.
